



The Shepherd's Crook Food Pantry at St. Paul's by-the-Sea Episcopal Church in Ocean City is currently open three mornings a week to serve those with the need for food items, a bagged lunch and some toiletries. During the summer months, many of the international students working in Ocean City are served.

This summer, Shepherd's Crook is experiencing an overwhelming increase in the number of clients, due to the rising cost of food and the influx of international students coming into Ocean City. Between 80 and 100 clients come through the doors in the two

Shepherd's Crook was founded in 2002 by church parishioners whose goal was to "Feed My Sheep" (John 21:17). It is run entirely by volunteers from both within and without the parish. Shepherd's Crook operates out of DeWees Hall (on 3rd Street) 3 days a week (Monday, Tuesday and Thursday) from 10 am to Noon.

The History of Service of Morning Prayer

Until the "new" Prayer Book of 1979 became the Prayer Book which guided our worship, the normative worship service on a Sunday morning was Morning Prayer. Three Sundays of the month ended without Eucharist — which was celebrated only once a month. The Morning Prayer worship included beautiful Canticles and a Great Thanksgiving that have been all but forgotten.

When Christianity was first made legal in 313 AD and the followers of "The Way" (the name chosen by the first Christians) were no longer being persecuted, some very faithful leaders began establishing communities that offered a more intense experience of the sacred and prevented their being tempted by worldly things. They soon established a set time for prayer. This grew out of the Jewish custom of reciting prayers at set times of the day in which people stopped whatever they were doing and prayed. Eventually early Christians prayed the Psalms daily and by 60 AD were encouraged to pray the Lord's Prayer 3 times a day. Soon there were seven fixed prayer times a day: Lauds (early morning), Prime (first hour of daylight), Terce (third hour), Sext (noon), Nones (ninth hour), Vespers (sunset evening), Compline (end of the day) and Matins (in the morning at cockcrow).

After the Reformation in the 16th century and the Anglican separation from the Roman Church, our Prayer Book included the services of Morning Prayer, Evening Prayer and Compline with abbreviated outlines for services at other times of day such as Noon Days prayers. This is a rich and historical tradition and can serve as an aid to worship whenever we need the discipline of a prayer service that is not free form. It is what the gift of our tradition offers us.
